Co), bur Lawson family cem; Pvt, Co. C, 24th Va. Inf., CSA, served four years throughout the Civil War, he was in Pickett's Charge at battle of Gettysburg, and present at surrender of Gen. Lee at Appomattox; son of Elder William L. Lawson & Anna Thompson Lawson; 5 children.

She was named Lily Jane by her father because of her lily-like complexion, which she retained all of her long life. She later changed her name to Lillie Dale.

The following account was published in the Richmond Times-Dispatch: "Floyd C. H., Va., May 19 - At the hospitable home of Mrs. L. D. Lawson this morning at 8 o'clock Miss Lottie Ruth, her beautiful and accomplished daughter, was given in marriage to Mr. William Fielding Tulloh, of Halifax. Grouped around the improvised altar were the near relatives of the bride and groom, and the scene presented was worthy of a painter's brush. The vows were spoken which united the twain for life.
